# The GP-led Bradford on Avon Leg Club<sup>®</sup> and other news

Bradford on Avon Leg Club<sup>\*</sup> opened its doors on the 6th February 2014, initially treating between 15 and 20 people per week. The Leg Club's success meant it soon needed a bigger space and it was relocated just five months later. There are now over 120 registered members at Bradford on Avon with 50 members treated on average each week at the Leg Club's new premises at St Margaret's Hall. It has become so busy that an additional nurse has been recruited by the management team. The clinical team and GP practice have been both surprised and pleased, in particular by how many male Leg Club members are now attending.

The aim of the social Leg Club model is to provide a seamless service to the local community and this ethos has been wholeheartedly embraced in Bradford on Avon. In September, the team began running an all-day Leg Club Doppler service and offering flu vaccines to Leg Club members. They are now also developing an NHS check for the over 75s, which includes a gait test, falls assessment and memory test. In addition, a space has been set aside for Age Concern for social nail cutting.

The Leg Club team has addressed social isolation by providing a volunteer cafe area, which offers a space for people to meet and chat or, alternatively, to browse the book library or daily papers that are available. They have a team of volunteers who are at the front of house, providing refreshments and an active committee. The local Mayor was so impressed with the Leg Club when he visited that he is opening his chambers, which are adjacent to the hall, to members to use as a games room where they can play draughts, backgammon and dominos.

Leg Club Industry Partners (LCIP) attend every week to assist with everything from the bucket run to providing advice and support to the Leg Club nurses. Amanda Brooks, business manager and Leg Club project lead at Bradford on Avon & Melksham Health Partnership (BOAMHP), has been busily raising the profile of the primary care-led Leg Club service across Wiltshire and we have been informed that Westbury were successful with their bid to open a Leg Club in the New Year. Wiltshire CCG has been very supportive and their Chief Officer, Deborah Fielding, is extremely positive about the social Leg Club model. Amanda has also been industrious in her fundraising on behalf of the Club. She has received support from the Town Council, the local Lions club and a member of the Club who wishes to remain anonymous. The Area Board put Amanda in touch with an arts practitioner who was looking to set up a creative walks/art project. Together they successfully bid for £4,000K from the Community Foundation and work on the project at the Leg Club commenced at the beginning of September.

Amanda is a great ambassador for the Foundation and is always happy to discuss the model with anyone who is interested. She said: "it has been a challenge, but now CCGs are more responsive to different models we are confident of going from strength to strength." #### ANNUAL LEG CLUB CONFERENCE

### BARNSTAPLE LEG CLUB SHORTLISTED FOR PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

Barnstaple Leg Club has been short-listed in the primary care innovation category of the 2014 *Health Service Journal* (HSJ) awards. The award entry entitled "Commissioning the Leg Club model" was based on the Barnstaple Leg Club in Devon, which became the first Leg Club to be commissioned in September 2013.

The Leg Club model has been shown to reduce the social isolation that patients with leg ulcers feel and encourages Leg Club members to engage with self-management of their condition through peer support and an ongoing well-leg regime.

Since it was launched, Barnstaple Leg Club has delivered some impressive outcomes in terms of healing rates. The Leg Club team work alongside volunteers from North Devon Volunteers Service to provide the social dimension to Barnstaple Leg Club.

Suzanne Flannery, event executive for the HSJ Awards, said: "We received the highest number of entries in the awards history, over 1,300, so to be shortlisted is a fantastic achievement." Mark Elster, Patient Safety & Quality Manager for the North Devon Locality of the CCG, said: "In a time where NHS resources are severely stretched and continue to be challenged, being able to share the Barnstaple Leg Club approach and success with the wider healthcare sector is a tremendous opportunity and privilege."
