The Leg Ulcer Forum

The Leg Ulcer Forum (LUF) provides a unique forum for nurses working within the field of leg ulcer management and wound care. The dedicated membership of health care professionals all working specifically with, or influencing the care of, patients with leg ulcers (whatever the aetiology), makes it one of the most influential patient-orientated organisations in the UK. The aims of the LUF are to facilitate discussion, debate and reflective practice; disseminate new research; identify and support areas of good practice; provide support to specialist nurses involved in both identifying the need for, and establishing, leg ulcer services; and encouraging continuous professional development through a variety of educational activities. Membership is open to professionals involved in the prevention and treatment of leg ulceration and costs only £15 per year, for which members receive at least 8 dedicated mailings — including personal copies of the Leg Ulcer Forum Journal, exclusive educational publications, the wound care supplement from the Nursing Times (produced in collaboration with LUF), and access to the forum's website. The Tissue Viability Society

In April the Tissue Viability Society hosted its annual conference in Birmingham. 2006 marks the 25th anniversary of the TVS, and the conference programme reflected this milestone. The event opened with a presentation by Dr James Robertson, one of the early pioneers of the TVS and a past Chair of the society and Editor of the *Journal of Tissue Viability*. This session reminded delegates of the society's history while the rest of the programme looked at how it could move pressure ulceration higher up the professional, public and political agenda. One clear marker of the growing importance of the society was the attendance by the current Chairs of the European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel, the US National Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel and the European Wound Management Association (EWMA). It was excellent to see partnerships between these groups emerge. In 2007 the TVS will be one of the organisations working with EWMA when it hosts its annual meeting in Glasgow (2–4 May 2007). Another marker of the development of the TVS was the submission and presentation of free papers from delegates located in Europe and the US.TVS now looks forward to the remainder of its anniversary year culminating in May 2007 with the EWMA conference.
